# BOOKS AND LITERATURE:

## **Book for Young Children (Storybooks):**

- The Invisible String by Patrice Karst (ages 3 and up)
  - This book offers a gentle approach to help overcome the fear of loneliness or separation.
    It is a creative book that children can easily identify with and remember.
- The Memory Box by Joanna Rowland
  - O A Book about Grief. Describes what it is like to remember and grieve a loved one who has died.
- The Next Place by Warren Hanson (ages 4 and up)
  - This is a story of the next place, a place of light and hope where earthly hurt is left behind. It is a celebration of life. This story presents death in a non-secular/religious way.
- When Dinosaurs Die: A Guide to Understanding Death by Laurie Kransy Brown and Marc Brown (ages 4 to 10)
  - o This is a guide to help children understand what death means and how to cope with feelings.
- Lifetimes by Bryan Mellonie (ages 5 to 10)
  - O This is a story about life and death. It uses nature, animals and people. It talks about beginnings, endings, and living in between.
- The Fall of Freddie the Leaf by Leo Buscaglia (ages 5 to 9)
  - o This is a story about a leaf named Freddie. It describes the seasons of life and death through nature.
- Sad Isn't Bad by Michaelene Mundy (ages 3 to 10)
  - o A good-grief guidebook for kids dealing with loss.
- The Gifts of Gerbert's Feathers by Meaghann Weaver & Lori Weaver (ages 4 to 8)
  - o A story about strength, courage, determination, and love. Used to help children dealing with an illness or those who are worried about others with a serious illness.

#### **Books for Teens:**

- Healing Your Grieving Heart for Teens by Alan Wolfelt (ages 12 to 18)
  - 100 practical ideas that can help survivors learn to express their grief and mourn naturally.
- Fire in My Heart, Ice in My Veins by Enid Samuel Traisman (ages 12 to 18)
  - A guided grief journal for teens and young adults, options to write letters, copy down meaningful lyrics, write songs and poems, tell the person who died what they want them to know, and use their creativity to work through the grieving process.

  - o This is a coloring book that shows the many feelings grieving children may have.
- When Someone Very Special Dies by Marge Heegaard (ages 3 to 10)

- A practical format for allowing children to understand the concept of death and develop coping skills for life.
- Help Me Say Goodbye: Activities for Helping Kids Cope When a Special Person Dies by Janis Silverman (Ages 4 to 12)
  - O An art therapy book. It encourages children to express their feelings in words or pictures. Topics include what to say or do, feelings, how to remember your loved one.
- How I Feel: Grief Journal for Kids by Mia Roldan (ages 8 to 12)
  - o Guided prompts to explore your feelings and find peace for children.

  - o An resource for helping children learn the basic concepts of illness and various ageappropriate ways of coping with it.
